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"HIV disclosure: how, when, to whom"



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Anonymous self-reported **questionnaire** with a longitudinal perspective, based on multiple choice and open questions.

23 items, 6 macroareas: epidemiology, disclosure's quantity, disclosure's quality, discrimination/law, support, disclosure obstacles.

Pilot study run from June 2015 to April 2016 at Amedeo di Savoia Hospital and Arcobaleno AIDS Association, Torino.

Sample: 243 out of 250 respondent volunteer outpatients.

Resignation, sense of guilt, avoidance mostly in sexual approaches.

Conclusions:



- •243 out of 250 questionnaires returned.
- •Only 11 respondents out of 243 have not disclosed ...yet
- •1/3 of the sample has been **discriminated**: in workplaces, hospitals, schools.
- •Fear of not being accepted is very common among respondents and may inhibit disclosure. 6% talked about their HIV status for the first time only after 10 years.
- •There are "fragile" categories of PLWHA, such as **women**, **adolescents** and **migrants**, for whom it may be even more difficult to disclose.
- •Results report **support** and **relief** as the main emotions felt after disclosure. As time goes by, neither the emotions nor the number of people to talk to appear to show a high degree of change.
- •The most common interlocutors are partners, friends, relatives.
- •33% have not disclosed to GP (yet ?).
